## Faith Matters: What does it mean to be people of the Journey?

One way or another, most of us are people of a journey. The question is: What does that mean to us? And what does it mean to have fellow travelers?


Regardless of how we physically move or whether we have ever left the house in which we were born, we are all travelers on the path.

Joseph Campbell was the first to describe the classic hero's journey:

A fool called to adventure  
Encountering a series of misfortunes and temptations  
Culminating with the greatest danger possible  
Followed by a transformation and rebirth  
And heroically returning home the prized reward  
Only to begin again with the next call to adventure.

You can find this classic journey pattern in Homer's *Odyssey*, Spielberg's *Star Wars*, *Little Red Riding Hood*, and Wagner's operatic *Ring Cycle*. The journey is a circle, which is why we never tell it just once. Children love to hear bedtime stories over and over again. We watch favorite movies and read favorite books several times in a row. We like narratives that have beginnings, middles and ends. We make the same mistakes year after year, and family habits are passed down from one generation to the next.

If you spend some time with the Hero's Journey, you can probably find it in your life story, your family's story, and in your nation's story.



One of these pictures shown in this column is of a European family entering the United States through Ellis Island. The other is of a family entering the United States from Mexico. I could have also included pictures of the Native American Trail of Tears, the African American Great Migration, the Syrian Refugee Crisis and countless other tragic journeys of present day and history.



The people, the families and the journeys are completely different, and yet they are similar. Only the traveler can tell us what stage of the journey they are in – in the midst of misfortune and temptation, in deepest danger, or in the throes of transformation. Only the traveler can tell us what called them to leave home. Was it to seek their fortune? Was it to escape tyranny? Was it to survive?

The journeys of these people and our journey as a society are linked. And because we create our society, the journeys of all these people are linked to our journey as individual citizens in this democratic nation. Like most things, telling our collective and individual stories is complicated. Lots of questions. Perhaps that's why they call it a quest.

Regardless, I invite you this month to ask questions and dive deeper into the meaning of your journey and our journeys together. This is holy work. After all, what is our flaming chalice, but a symbol of the holy grail?

## March Religious Education News

As we move into our month of Journey, watching how it coincides with Women's History Month, the Religious Education Ministry Team would like to reach out and engage the rest of the congregation in a month-long service project.

At the Oscars this February, the film *Period. End of Sentence* won the award for Best Short Documentary. The film is about the stigma of menstruation in a village in rural India and its effect on the women and girls there. It is a moment that is notable and poignant because the stigma surrounding periods is a worldwide phenomenon and affects people who menstruate in the United States as well. This was brought into sharp relief when one anonymous male member of the Academy wrote on his ballot, "[I'm not going to vote for] *Period. End of Sentence* — it's well done, but it's about women getting their period, and I don't think any man is voting for this film because it's just icky for men."

The stigma placed on menstruation affects the most vulnerable members of our society in myriad ways. From the sometimes prohibitive cost and lack of availability of menstrual products to the often misinformed understanding of the physiology of menstruation, it can be incredibly difficult for those in financial need or those with marginalized identities to access the products they need during their periods.

For the first three Sundays in March, the Religious Education program will be collecting the following products to help create menstruation kits for local shelters in need and in order to donate the products in whole to other organizations in our community. On the last Sunday of the month, we invite members of the congregation to join us during coffee hour to pack kits for donation.

Please deposit the following items into the bin near the RE Table on Sunday mornings in March:

- Sanitary pads of various sizes
- Tampons of various sizes
- Small packages of hand wipes
- Small packages of flushable wipes
- Alcohol wipes
- Gallon-sized Ziploc bags

We are hoping that this project will make a small difference in the lives of people in our community who are affected by stigma, financial restraints, and homelessness.

## Music Notes – March 2019

There's a tried-and-true weather-related idiom about the month of March, that it *comes in like a lion and goes out like a lamb*. The collected wisdom of that saying is taken with a grain of salt by us Western New Yorkers, since we typically look askance at our *Journey* through March, having already survived a tumultuous February. The Soul Matters question of this month – *What does it mean to be a People of Journey?* – is a difficult one, since it can oftentimes feel impossible to evaluate our *Journey* as we take it. Where will we find ourselves this March, two-thirds of the way through a Church Year which began with the monthly question of *Vision*, back in September? Where do we expect to see ourselves this June, when we take up the theme of *Beauty*? And, what will all this **sound** like??

We begin the month on March 3<sup>rd</sup> with Rev. Montagnes's sermon, *No More Caravans of Despair*. This Rumi paraphrase is well-known from our hymn, *Come, Come, Whoever You Are*, and our service music will try to reflect the depth and mission of the quotation. Armenian American composer, Alan Hovhaness's setting of the 130<sup>th</sup> Psalm, *Out of the Depths*, will feature your UUCB Choir with soprano soloist, Jessie Downs, and Robert Graziano on our Sanctuary Organ. The service will begin with a solo Cornette rendition of the Duke Ellington classic, *Caravan*, and a choral arrangement of James Taylor's *The Lonesome Road* will also be heard.

*On the Path*, our March 10<sup>th</sup> service, will feature vocal soloists in selections from Gustav Mahler's *Songs of a Wayfarer* and Ned Rorem's *A Journey*. Our Choir anthem that week will be Randall Thompson's brilliant setting of Robert Frost's *The Road Not Taken*.

On March 17<sup>th</sup> – Saint Patrick's Day – we welcome local theater legend, Vincent O'Neill in a service which will include some traditional Irish reels, selected and performed by Leslie Nickerson on her fiddle, alongside the choral classics, *The Parting Glass* and *Down by the Sally Gardens*. Soloist, Matthew Spaulding will also take up the tune, *John O' Dreams*, accompanying himself on the guitar. Finally, we end the month with our Spring Multigenerational Service, with music provided by our soloists and brass-and-keyboard duo as your Choir spends the week preparing for our April 28<sup>th</sup> Music Sunday service – a entirely different kind of *Journey*!

## March Share-the-Plate: [Buffalo Immigrant Leadership Team \(BILT\)](#)



Beginning in 2015, VOICE-Buffalo organizers conducted one-on-one conversations with former refugees, service providers and ministers to gain an understanding of needs and interests, and to identify potential leaders. A concern about the education of younger generations came up as the burning issue.

Individuals from Burma, Rwanda, Iran and other countries started meeting around their shared concerns. They wanted to address graduation rates, inaccessible community schools, and arbitrary disciplinary procedures, because no one else was doing anything about these problems. Recognizing the significance of their own voices, these individuals decided to organize, and BILT was born.

Over the course of three years, BILT leaders have developed relationships with the Buffalo Public Schools power-players, and held three public meetings with over 850 people present. Through these interactions, BILT is beginning to see some results.

### ***What is it? How do I get involved?***



### **Restorative Justice Day, April 13, 2019**

Hosted by the University at Buffalo, 8:30 am-5:00 pm, Diefendorf Hall, UB So Campus

**Restorative Justice Day is an annual conference aimed at bringing university, school, and community members together to learn about restorative practices.**

- **Restorative practices run on a spectrum**, from community building in elementary schools, to criminal diversion in the courts. Typically conducted in the form of a circle, restorative practices help bring together classrooms and communities to build strong foundations and repair harm when it occurs.
- **Our goal in hosting Restorative Justice Day is to have a space where people from all walks of life can learn about restorative practices**, and see how they are being used - in our schools, courts, and communities. The day includes keynote speeches from experts in the national restorative justice community, workshops to introduce attendees to community, court, school, youth, and cultural circles, and performances by local cultural organizations.






