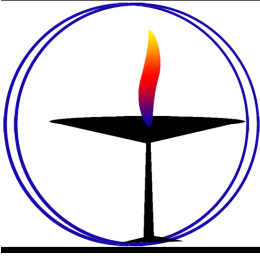

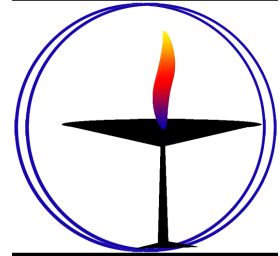

Congratulations!

The time of waiting and wondering and wishing has come to an end! It was just about four years ago when the members and friends of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Buffalo came to understand that you would collectively be entering a period of intentional transition. When you began you probably had little idea of all that this could hold.

The Interim journey for UUCB has been extraordinarily long, and included both some steep up-hill climbs and winding paths that led the church through some unexpectedly challenging terrain. It has required just about everyone to develop a certain comfort in the midst of what naturally seems to us to be very uncomfortable – to learn the art of making peace with existence in the “between times” especially when we really do not know how they will conclude.

Completing this transition has taken sustained courage and persistent work, but more importantly, it required the will to maintain connection with one another when conditions became difficult or at best, seemed uncertain. There have been moments of significant loss and there was a need to pause to honor this fact. There have been occasions for disappointment, confusion, and, hurt that also required time and patience to address. You have listened to things you really did not want to hear. And, you were not overwhelmed! You have passed many landmarks, made tough decisions, sought advice, and shared credit for accomplishments. All of these things bespeak an underlying resilience. This is some of the hardest work a congregation can do together and it should be treated as such.

You have reached the shore of a new land and by all accounts, a promising vision of UUCB’s future is unfolding before your eyes. You are honestly ready to welcome all that is coming into view now with greater joy now that you know for certain that The Rev. Joan Montagnes will be your next Settled Minister.

During the next few weeks, we will be doing our best to bring our interim work to a state of completion and closure. We will assess our experience so that it aids in future planning.

The Staff and I will be coordinating efforts to support the congregation during summer months and will plan in advance for Joan’s arrival in Buffalo on August 1, 2015.

I expect also that in various configurations we will find proper ways of saying our thanks and farewells.

June 14 will be my final service in the pulpit at UUCB. This will be a Flower Communion Service. After that I plan to attend the Interim Ministry Network Meeting and then meetings associated with UU Minister’s Association and the UUA General Assembly in Portland, Oregon.

Just in case you have not heard: WE HAVE A NEW SETTLED MINISTER!!!

She is the Rev. Joan Montagnes, most recently of Bellevue, Washington and a native of Ontario.

The Special Congregational meeting was held on Sunday, May 3 with around 190 members in attendance. Here are the words which introduced the motion to vote on calling Rev. Joan as our next settled minister:

We, the members of the Ministerial Search committees, covenanted with all of you, and with each other, to dedicate ourselves to the search for a settled minister who would be the best good fit for this beloved congregation.

We were guided by who **you** expressed that this minister should be - their skills, talents, personal qualities and - above all - their integrity. Your hopes and your trust in us sustained us.

And now - after nearly two years of search and discernment, we recommend to the Board of Trustees and to you, the members of this congregation, the Rev. Joan Montagnes as *the first woman settled minister in the over 175 year history of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Buffalo.*



The vote was unanimous!

We, the Ministerial Search Committee, are grateful for all the love and support we received from you over the last 11 months. We are grateful to the members of the 2013-2014 Ministerial Search Committee for the groundwork they did upon which we were able to build this year. And we are grateful that our work is completed in such a wonderful way. Praise be that we can now begin our walk with the leadership and commitment of Rev. Joan, creating together a vibrant and fulfilling reality for UUCB.

- It's Faith Development which give our children and adults alike the opportunity to connect to the interdependent web by participating in the cycle of the season and the miracle of tending a seed into a plant that feeds them, bringing awareness of a power greater than ourselves.
- It's a spiritual practice. Gardens are on "slow time" and tending them can be a meditative practice as we nurture what is healthy and weed out that which does not serve.
- It's Social Justice to raise awareness of the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee's 100 Gardens project. Cash donations for produce will go to the UUSC to help people in Haiti grow gardens.
- It's service, providing an opportunity to cook for our church community from the food that we have grown
- It's a social justice project as the food we pick and do not use is donated to Food Not Bombs or Soul of Buffalo to feed people in need and raise awareness of peaceful ways of bridging our differences.
- And most of all, it's community building, bringing together people of all ages to accomplish making all of these things happen.

Our Director of Lifespan Faith Development is encouraged to take most of her vacation and study leave time in the summer. It is important to have many volunteers to help keep our church active and vibrant for children and families throughout the season as it is a time when many of our neighbors decide to visit our church for the very first time. This summer, Faith Development classes will consist of time in the Garden, Spirit Play classes, special crafts, game days, spiritual practices and community gatherings mostly provided by lay volunteers. Looking Forward...

Thoughts on the concluding Choir season, a musical Summer, and an exciting future!

As I write this newsletter column, I'm less than half a day away from an exciting collaboration between members of our Choir, including our soloists and Su Lee, and my student orchestra at UB. My colleague, the wonderful choir director, Harold Rosenbaum, and I initiated an annual collaboration between my students and his UB Choir, when I first came to Buffalo five years ago. Tonight we get to celebrate in the best way possible (with Beethoven!) the richness of connection and the abundance of cultural treasures we have in our greater community.

Last summer Maestro Rosenbaum brought his dynamic and engaging choral conducting workshop to Buffalo, and I was delighted not only to participate as a singer and to audit the course, gleaning all I could from the young choral conductors grappling with challenges of the repertoire and technique, but it was also deeply gratifying that a few members of our Choir were able to participate, as well. These community connections can be so valuable – I truly believe that our Music Program outreach efforts can contribute in a significant way to our Church's visibility throughout our wider community, and as we share our musical gifts with new partner organizations, we'll do our part to spread the word of our principles, our values and commitments to social justice. The fledgling series of *Recitals on Elmwood*, begun last spring, invites local college students and other musicians to concertize in our sanctuary space, and is a similar outreach effort.

This is a way of saying that these initiatives have only just begun, and while there's one major operatic collaboration for our Choir on the horizon for November, 2015 that I'd love to share with you now, I don't want to make any official announcements here until our partners have done so. **However, please don't think of the activities of our Music Program as some autonomous part of our Church** that the rest of us merely get to hear on Sundays. With the end of the Choir season in sight, there's much work to do in planning music for the summer, and **I would like to reiterate my call for a Music Team** consisting of members of our congregation who love music and who would like to contribute to the organizing, brainstorming, and planning of music in and out of our church. This Team would be distinct in structure and goals when compared with our extant Choir Team, and it would be wonderful to have this framework in place before Rev. Montagnes begins her work with us, later this summer. With the flexibility that our summer schedule allows for music planning, the time is ripe for our Music Team to come together!

Denomination and Interfaith Connections

Back on March 27 and 28 about a dozen intrepid UUCB members attended this year's joint St. Lawrence and Ohio Meadville District Assembly. Sharing the May Plate with The Veterans One-Stop Center of Western New York



In keeping with our mission to create a more just and compassionate world, the Unitarian Universalist Church of Buffalo shares our weekly collection plate with a local agency, living out our generosity in the Buffalo community. The May share-the-plate recipient is The Veterans One Stop Center of Western New York. The Veterans One Stop Center is a community based, independent, nonprofit collaborative, offering U.S. veterans, service members, and their families the convenience of a barrier-free One-Stop Center in which to access a coordinated, individualized suite of services.

The VOC of WNY offers personalized assistance in an environment that is welcoming, affirming, and responsive to each individual veteran's specific needs. Through innovative public and private partnerships the VOC uses a collaborative approach to serving the entire veteran by linking them with community resources and providing an individually tailored plan designed to meet the specific needs of the veteran and their family. As our nation's involvement in over eleven years of combat begins to wind down, the need for the Veterans One-Stop Center of WNY could not be more pronounced nor more immediate. The VOC works with veterans returning from Iraq and Afghanistan as well as veterans of past conflicts. Complementing the efforts of the Department of Veterans Affairs and the Department of Defense along with state, county and local public and private resources the VOC exists in order to provide a full network of services in an integrated, coordinated manner – from comprehensive outreach and intake, through case management and support services. The Veterans One Stop Center provides solutions to many of the challenges our WNY veterans, service members and their families face in the successful achievement of their goals and reintegration into our community.



In the Share-the-Plate program, the church donates half the unrestricted donations made during each Sunday's offertory to a designated charity or organization identified by the Social Justice Task Force under policies formulated by the Board of Trustees. Recipients of the UUCB Share-the-Plate program must be either a 501(c)3 or 501(c)4 non-profit organization, and they must do work that is consistent with Unitarian Universalist principles. Any

member of the congregation may nominate a recipient organization through the UUCB Social Justice Task Force.

Pledge payments may still be placed in the collection plate, either in a donation envelope or clearly marked "pledge" in the memo line. All undesignated cash goes to Share the Plate. If you wish to donate to Share the Plate by check, or with cash in an envelope, please note "Share the Plate" or just "Share" in the memo line or on the envelope. Envelopes are available from the ushers.

On going efforts by the Social Justice Task force are the collection of non-perishable food donations for the Network of Religious Communities as well as recycling of old cell phones and printer cartridges. Donations can be left in the baskets at both entrances to the sanctuary. The next meeting of the Social Justice Task Force will be Sunday, May 17th at 12:15 PM.

The Woman's Society May and June Field Trips

On Thursday May 14 we will visit the Buffalo Transportation Pierce Arrow Museum. A special guided tour will be given by Jim Sandoro who is the founder and owner of the museum. The fee is \$20. per person. The museum is located at 263 Michigan Avenue. We will gather there at 10:30 and the tour will start at 11. Reservations and payment

must be made in person at the same time on Sunday, May 10 after the church service. No prior reservation can be made and funds cannot be received in the office. Pay directly at the Woman's Society table in the parish hall. Board members will be at the table. This will be a great opportunity to learn about the history of transportation in Buffalo. The museum and its contents will be a feast for our eyes!



On Friday June 5 we will have our much anticipated field trip to the Shaw Festival in Niagara on the Lake to see the production of "Sweet Charity" There is a limited number of tickets (40) at \$50 each. Reservations and payment must be made at the same day. Tickets will be sold starting Sundays May 10, 17, 24 and 31. No prior reservations can be made and payment cannot be received in the office. We will meet at the Festival Theatre foyer at 11. We will be treated to our own private talk which will certainly enhance our experience of the play. We can have lunch in town and be back well before the 2 P.M. production.

NOTE: We will be selling tickets for the museum and NOTL simultaneously on May 10. You are welcome to purchase tickets for both events on that days, if you wish.

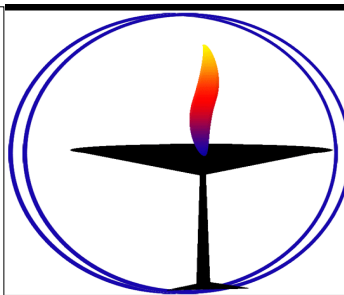
