It's not too late to be part of Religious Education this fall at UUCB! Here's a list of our fall program offerings:

PreK – Sundays at 12 noon, class will meet on Zoom for a live chalice lighting, story, and a video tutorial of an accompanying craft. We will be using the Padlet app to provide links for families to connect with the lessons and craft tutorials on their own time.

Spirit Play (K-2) – Sundays at 1 pm class will meet on Zoom for stories, wondering questions, and sharing time. Supplementary online materials will be available via the Padlet app.

Workshops (K-5) – Sundays at 2 pm, class will meet on Zoom to engage with monthly themes and rotate through Music, Art, Science, and Social Action sessions.

Graphic Novels (4th-9th Grade) – Sundays at 3 pm, class will meet EVERY OTHER WEEK on Zoom will encourage spiritual exploration, deepen knowledge of Unitarian Universalist History, and call us to action based on our UU values, all while creating original graphic novels and stories. On the off weeks, we'll use the Padlet app to connect students with videos, recorded interviews, links to webcomics and UU history sites, and interactive activities.

Coming of Age (8th-9th Grade) – Sundays, 6 pm. (Already in progress but open to new members) Class meets twice a month online, exploring their journeys as Unitarian Universalists, learn about our Unitarian Universalist history, and developing their personal faith credos. This class involves fundraising for an end of the year heritage trip to Boston (June 2021, hopefully!)

High School Youth Group (9th-12th Grade) - Our high school youth meet weekly to check in with one another, have fun together, engage in social justice actions, and plan or participate in local and regional youth conferences with other UU youth. MUSIC NOTES



Daniel Bassin, Music Director

During this month of October, we join hundreds of *Soul Matters* congregations in asking the question, *What does it mean to be a people of Deep Listening?* As a musician with some specialization in contemporary composition, reading the term, ‘Deep Listening’ immediately fills me with nostalgia and a sense of wonder at how even small expressions of an individual’s artistic purview can have lasting impact. The term, though now frequently encountered in Unitarian Universalist covenant groups and in restorative justice and other social practices, was originally coined by the American maverick composer and sound improviser, Pauline Oliveros (1932-2016), as something of a pun after descending into a cave for a recording project. The musician’s goal of such an aural focus sought to bridge the gap between composition and improvisation, in order to arrive at and uplift the creative spark within a performing collective. As a community of shared values together at the precipice of our moment – election, pandemic, societal comeuppance for the legacies of white supremacy and systemic injustice, – we face a mandate to listen deeply and to grow and change together.

On Sunday, October 4th, we gather in the virtual realm of Zoom for Rev. Joan Montagnes’s sermon, *Will Listen for Change*. Our music begins seasonally, with Bernice Petkere’s jazz standard, *Lullaby of the Leaves*. Soloist, Helen Lowry, will offer up the song “Children will Listen” from Stephen Sondheim’s musical, *Into the Woods*, as well as song lead the beloved hymn, *There is More Love Somewhere*. Our solo quartet will be heard in the hymn, *Wake Now My Senses*, and a musical reflection of Deep Listening will be played on our Sanctuary Steinway by Jonathan Vogtle, György Kurtág’s piano piece, *The very last conversation with László Dörnyei*. Finally, Jon will conclude the service with a movement from the unjustly neglected pianist composer, Vladimir Drozdov’s *Au Tombeau de Rachmaninoff*.

Julie Taylor and Shawn Doyle will lead the service on National Coming Out Day, October 11th, *Answering the Call of Love*. Your UUCB Choir and Soloists have again dedicated themselves to a digital recording project, making sure the eponymous hymn for this service sounds as rousing and inspiring as when we gather in person. Service music begins with Billy Strayhorn’s jazz masterpiece, *Lush Life*, and we’ll also hear from our solo quartet in Amy Beach’s choral anthem, *Peace I Leave with You*.

Our service on the 18th *this amazing day*, takes its title (and capitalization) from the 20th century poet and polymath, e e cummings. A setting of his poem, *i thank You God*, will be performed by our soloists on a service that also features Matthew Spaulding’s rendition of “Simple Song” from Leonard Bernstein’s *MASS* and a new arrangement by Jessie Downs of Duke Ellington’s *Come Sunday*. We’ll work through a ‘new’ hymn on this service, too: #357 in *Singing the Living Tradition*, “Bright Morning Stars.” Jon Vogtle’s service prelude will introduce the piece, and we’ll sing it during the service as well as the opening hymn from *Singing the Journey* (our ‘Teal’ hymnal), “Morning Has Come.”


Finally, we end the month with our Stewardship Sunday worship service, *Now’s the Time*. Music for that festive service kicks-off with Charlie Parker’s famous blues that gives our service its title. Our own Michael Harris has created for this service a bespoke version of Leslie Bricusse’s *Once in a Lifetime*. We’ll also hear John Coltrane’s *After the Rain*, and lift up our collective voices in the hymns *Enter, Rejoice and Come In* and *Oh, We Give Thanks*.

Auction News

“This Little Light of Mine”

“This Little Light of Mine,” is Peter Sloan’s donation to the 2020 Fun & Fellowship Auction. Each year, Peter creates an original linoleum block print representing a revered aspect of UUCB life. This year’s piece depicts a sanctuary chandelier, which is actually an “electrolier.” The electroliers that grace the ceiling of our beloved sanctuary are made especially beautiful with the addition of candles lighted for Christmas Eve services.

Most people would call these works of art chandeliers, but technically “chandelier” means the fitting was originally made for candles. Electroliers began to appear in the early 1900’s as people began to convert their homes to electricity and wanted a beautiful ‘chandelier’ powered by this incredible new energy. Electroliers were wired for electricity as well as being fitted with candle holders. Preservationist Tom Yots shared this quote from the August 4, 1906 Buffalo Courier: “The electroliers are lanterns of isinglass and wrought iron, suspended by iron chains from the woodwork. They are most artistic.”



During our time apart, an original print has been seen each week hanging to the right of Rev. Joan during our virtual worship services. This lovely image, entitled “This Little Light of Mine,” has come to represent the radiating warmth of the UUCB community, as each of us brings our “little light” into connection with each other. Such a welcoming image calling us all together.

But we wanted to make this image available to everyone, as a symbol of the connection the UUCB community has maintained in this most challenging of times. Peter has worked with a local graphics company to produce affordable copies for all. ALSO AVAILABLE SOON - “West Ferry” - A print by Peter Sloan Capturing UUCB’s Heart and History

During our time apart, an original print entitled “West Ferry” has been seen hanging to the right of Worship Associates Fran and Ken Manly when they participate in our virtual worship services. This stunning image of the West Ferry doors represents not only UUCB’s intention to be a welcoming space for all, but it captures the rich architectural history that secured UUCB’s place in the National Register of Historic Places. The large arched oak doors, embellished with wrought iron decorative ornamentation resembling fleur-de-lis, are recognized not only for their charm and beauty, but for their place in social justice history. In 1968, during the draft resistance movement, police surrounded and stormed the church through these doors, in an effort to arrest anti-war activists who had sought sanctuary in UUCB. This print is timely in both its symbolic preservation of irreplaceable iconic structures and its reminder that UUCB has long been engaged locally and nationally in Social Justice issues,

Universal Accessible & Inclusion Ministry Team (UAIM)


There are any number of conditions that may create disabilities and limit full societal access. This month UAIM wants to highlight arthritis.

Arthritis means inflammation of the joints. The term, 'arthritis' is often used to refer to any disorder that affects the joints. There are 100 types of arthritis. In the United States, 40 million people have some type of arthritis. 2 in 5 adults over 65 have some form of arthritis. The two major types are Osteoarthritis and Rheumatoid Arthritis. Osteoarthritis usually comes with age and mostly affects the fingers, knees, and hips. Rheumatoid Arthritis is when the body's own defense system doesn't work properly. It affects joints and bones, and my also affect internal organs any systems. Other types of arthritis are gout, juvenile arthritis, ankylosing Spondylitis, psoriatic arthritis and reactive arthritis. More Women tend to have rheumatoid arthritis, whereas men tend to have gout. Gout is caused by crystals that build up in the joints. It usually affects the big toe but may affect other joints.

UAIM hopes you find this information useful. Our team misses face-to-face contact as does everyone else. We hope you are able to get outside and find fun activities.



Share-the-Plate October – [Prisoners are People Too, Inc.](#)



For the last fifteen years, this has been our mantra and our motto: Prisoners Are People Too; to deny their humanity, is to deny our own. This is our wholehearted belief. It defines and guides the work we do for incarcerated people and their families. It leads us as we educate the community about criminal justice issues. We support our returning citizens as they strive to be assets to their families and this community. The work we do can, at times, be frustrating and disappointing but it can also be fulfilling and gratifying. We encourage prisoners and their families to stay positive as we fight against inhumane and unprofessional treatment. We urge prisoners to keep their eyes on the ultimate prize which is their release.

Floyd, from Buffalo, went to prison 15 years ago ... leaving two sons behind who are now 16 and 17 years old. Floyd came home 3 weeks ago. He has worked with us for 9 months, preparing for his release. Pictures, letters, and infrequent visits helped him to stay somewhat connected to his children for 15 years, but they are teenagers now with "lives of their own." Floyd has a curfew now that has him in the house at a time earlier than his teen sons.

We are so proud of this man who favorably impressed the NYS Parole Board at his FIRST Parole Board hearing with his statements of remorse, rehabilitation, and plans for the future. We will continue to support Floyd during his reentry process.

Absentee Voting

Qualifications to Vote by Absentee Ballot

- Absent from your county or, if a resident of New York City absents from said city, on Election Day.
- Unable to appear at the polls due to temporary or permanent illness or disability; or because you are the primary care giver of one or more individuals who are ill or physically disabled.
- A resident or patient of a Veterans Health Administration Hospital.
- Detained in jail awaiting Grand Jury action or confined in prison after conviction for an offense other than a felony.

Silver Linings, Lasting Influences

Driving to lunch with a friend after the ingathering service, I listened to part of a conversation featuring Esther Perel, a relationship therapist, who noted that in her recent conversations with clients and in observing our society in general during this period, she, too, spoke of people “reaching for essence.”

Perhaps we could consider this introspection, this house-cleaning, this reckoning as a silver lining during this extraordinary time. When, throughout all this time of uncertainty, sorrow, and upheaval, we keep coming home to UUCB and the people who make it UUCB, that feels pretty essential to me.

During our lunch, my friend asked how UUCB’s endowment initiative was going, and I was pleased to share that at least seven individuals had indicated their intent to leave a legacy gift to UUCB since our first congregational meeting last fall. We also talked a bit about fundraising in general and I shared how in my 30+years of working with donors, I had seen many people (most of whom would not have described

themselves as wealthy) become visibly moved, proud, and content for having made provisions for college students seeking a better life.

That donor satisfaction at having reinforced their deeply-held core value was their vicarious gift to me, for which I will be forever grateful, and calls to mind a quote by philosopher, poet, and Unitarian minister Ralph Waldo Emerson that summarizes the relationship between philanthropic benefactors and beneficiaries. (Please forgive the gender references – he didn't know what we know now.)

It is one of the beautiful compensations of life that no man can sincerely try to help another without helping himself.

While we are in a time of social distancing, we continue to welcome discussions regarding providing for our (and for future generations') essential resource, UUCB. A chalice alit since 1831

A sanctuary on the National Registry of Historic Places
