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# Margret's Musings - The people God trusts?

One of the little "inside jokes" I heard when I first joined a UU church was that "we are the people God trusts enough to let us close down churches over the summer, knowing we will come back in the fall."

In the 1800's, when many of our churches were founded, our society was substantially rural, and entire families worked the fields around the clock in the summer to plant, cultivate and harvest the crops. In those years before air conditioning and sanitation systems, city dwellers who could afford it would head out to the mountains or seashore, seeking cooler, cleaner places to spend the time of heat, flies and noxious odors. Under those conditions, it made sense to operate our churches on a 10-month schedule, accommodating the economic and cultural patterns of society.

How much sense do those patterns make in this millenium, in a society that runs 24/7 all year around? This church has a rich tradition of lay-led worship while the minister takes some time off in July and August, and we have great volunteers providing the music and pastoral prayer for Sunday services. I have heard from several members that they first visited the church in the summer, and they liked those services well enough to come back for more. But it may take more than just a good Sunday sermon to keep this church vital and welcoming when the weather grows warm.

How do first-time visitors see the church on a summer Sunday – is there a membership greeter at the door to show them the ropes? Do people make a special effort to say hello during the coffee hour and tell them about the church? And if they arrive with children, is there something interesting for the kids to do while the adults are in the service? How do they find out that we provide nursery care for the youngest ones, even in the summer? Does someone tell them that our Covenant Groups continue to meet over the summer, and about other activities they might find welcoming?

This interim time is a great opportunity to think in new ways about what it means to be a leadership church for our movement in this vital urban setting. This is a good time to consider new possibilities, and how best this historic church may become a church for the future. It is so good to be with you – See you in church!



### News From Religious Education.

What a bittersweet time the end of the church year is. It is such a relief to take a break after the culmination of our school year commitments. But it is sad to know that many of our young people are leaving for college and it may be a long time before we see some of them again. But, summer in Buffalo is a beautiful thing and Elmwood Village certainly comes alive.

Summer is such a strange time for Unitarian Universalists. Perhaps it is a legacy of many of our church leaders being academics, but we tend to follow the academic year. Even when programming has been



available at church for children participation has been sparse. But it is a long time between May and September. That is a full quarter of the year; June, July, August plus another almost half month when you count the end of May and the beginning of September.

A full season is a long time to be away from community. So this year we will try a few new things. We will try to have someone at church to welcome new families every week. And I'll let you know when special events are happening that may have real appeal for children and youth. We will also have some community field trips and picnics over the summer; Informal opportunities to come together so that the kids can see each other and enjoy the direct experience of wonder that nature provides. For starters, The Buffalo Pride Parade is on June 3. This is a family event! Whether you or your children are Gay, Lesbian, Straight, Bisexual, Pansexual, Asexual, Transgender, Queer, Questioning, or just prefer to leave labels out of the conversation, we can attend in support of the many people who are still fighting for the right to love whomever they will. This is a first principle issue; the inherent worth and dignity of every person. I was concerned about how small our marching contingent was last compared to the size of our congregation until I realized that we had people peppered all through the parade in various organizations. I would love it if everyone who was participating could share on the Facebook event page from UUCB Pride Parade so that we get a stronger sense of how many of you do come out to support this important event. For those who wish to join me, I plan to have sign making material available at the church on June 3 so that kids can make signs to carry with their families.

In addition on June 10 there will be a Flower Communion. This is one of the most relevant rituals of our faith, but sadly our children are too often on to summer activities and rarely get to experience it at UUCB. If they're not there, you can leave a voice mail message that just they will be able to retrieve (and that is even forwarded to their e-mail!). The Board has formed a Policy Working Group to identify and gather the policies we have developed over the years, to refine and expand on them where necessary and to publish them in a single location where they can be kept current and can be referred to by anyone who has a question about procedure(s).

# Chalice Lighters Issue a Call for Contributions to Help the UUCB

The St. Lawrence District Chalice Lighters program has designated the proceeds from the current "call for contributions" to help our church hire a half-time Membership Coordinator. The description that came out with that request for donations reads:

UUCB is a vibrant and diverse church within a vibrant and diverse urban community, and we have much to celebrate. We are a Welcoming Congregation, providing spiritual sanctuary, support, and advocacy to our lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender members, friends, and neighbors. Our members come from a wide range of socio-economic, educational, religious, and ethnic backgrounds. Our Religious Education program is large and expanding, with about 60 children in attendance on any given Sunday, supported by dedicated volunteer teachers, our full-time Lifespan Director of Religious Education and a staffed nursery to care for our youngest ones. We place a high priority on making our loving congregation and historic building accessible and welcoming to all.

Like many Unitarian Universalist congregations, we have strengths upon which to build, and we are committed to create a vibrant stewardship in order to match the liveliness of our church and our community. We wish to deepen the spiritual experiences of our congregation; we wish to offer more opportunities to express our desire for social justice; we wish to welcome into our congregation more seekers of free religious expression.

This is an exciting time, full of momentous changes at UUCB, as we begin a deep process of self-examination and renewal during a crucial interim period between settled ministers. We as a congregation have a new sense of ownership of our congregation, and have seen a rising feeling of hope, energy and possibility as we go forward into our future.

We know our value as a church, and we want both to clearly articulate that value to our current membership and to make that value even more visible in our larger community. We want to strengthen our internal ties to one another even as we seek to expand those ties outward to include more members of our community. We think at this time we can best achieve our vision for strengthened connection with the addition of a paid half-time Membership Coordinator.

This support for the new position will be a big help in making our congregation more inviting,



welcoming and involving for prospective and new members. The UUCB Long Range Plan identifies as a priority the establishment of a paid Membership Coordinator position to revitalize our membership initiatives and to coordinate with the other areas of the church to provide a clear and meaningful path to membership. The Membership Coordinator will manage and implement all programs to welcome visitors, to provide a path to membership, to integrate new members and newcomers into the church community, and to support leadership development. The Membership Coordinator will provide staff support to the Membership Committee and work closely with the Minister and Director of Religious Education as well as the Church Administrator to ensure that programs effectively meet the goals of the Long Range Plan of the church.

The 2012 operating budget of the church has funds designated toward this new position, and we plan to hire someone in the fall. The Chalice Lighters support will enable us to make this staff expansion and thus enable us to build upon the strengths that make UUCB a vital home for all spiritual seekers. A warm thank-you to all our members who signed up to be Chalice Lighters, because you are helping make this dream a reality! And if you did not sign up and are feeling left out, there is still time to do so. Just pick up a blue form at the Chalice Lighters table in the Parish Hall after the service, and either leave it with us to send in, or send it in yourself.
