Minister's Column: What does it mean to be a People of Creativity?


Endings and beginnings are exciting times of creative tension. We rest between the known and the unknown, certainty and uncertainty, hopes and fears, and loss and gain. These spaces between "what is" and "what might be" are alive with possibility.

But who wants all that tension? Who wants the anxiety? Who wants to leave the the "comfortable old rut," especially when we were just getting used to the "comfortable old rut" after all the

upheaval of the last three years? Especially when the rest of the world is violently reeling in unprecedented times.

Who wants the all this tension? Trust me, you do.

Apparently, our minds are designed to look for ways to stay comfortable. We look for opportunities to rest and conserve our energy and whenever we can, we hold energy back, just in case we need it for an emergency. We like the "comfortable old rut." When we're in a pleasant, easy or luxurious environment, our minds get the message that all is well and we can relax,



but when we relax we shut off our motivation, attentiveness, and our creativity.

But just as you are kicking back with your feet up for the proverbial afternoon snooze on the sofa, something happens; like you have a baby, you get a promotion which means twice the work, or you move from one city to another. The "old comfortable rut" is not just gone, its obliterated. And your mind goes haywire. The good news is that our natural response to going haywire is creativity.

Usually when something comes up, we tackle the problems with our left-brain-directed thinking first. We look for technical solutions. We try to use tools at hand to resolve the issue and return to comfort. Only if the left brain can't solve the problem, or if it's a problem that the left brain doesn't like to work with (e.g. what color is a sunny day), will the left brain hand the problem over to the right brain and we start discovering exciting new ways of doing things. We find adaptive solutions. We get creative.

When allow ourselves to live in tension and uncertainty, rather than rush into solving a problem, the left brain is more willing to invite the right brain into activity. That's when you start to find more creative solutions and you discover your hidden superpowers.

Endings and beginnings are exciting times of creative tension. Allow yourself to live in this valuable period of being "in between." Invite your right brain to the party. Your discoveries and your creativity may surprise you.

OUR CHURCH HISTORY

Thirty-five years ago, novelist Kurt Vonnegut Jr. arrived at our church to give a lecture entitled, "How to Get a Job Like Mine." The next evening, a new Requiem with text by Mr. Vonnegut and music by Edgar Grana was premiered by the church choir directed by Barbara Wagner.

These events are noteworthy because a new, feature-length video documentary produced by 3-time Emmy Award-winning filmmaker Robert Weide and Don Argott on Mr. Vonnegut "the first of its kind on Vonnegut" — was released in 2021 to favorable reviews and it prominently depicts the Unitarian Universalist Church of Buffalo and its congregants. It is titled, Kurt Vonnegut: Unstuck in Time."

The film starts with Mr. Weide accompanying Mr. Vonnegut to our church; the church and our congregation then appear frequently throughout the film. This video documentary is available for viewing on DVD and on major streaming platforms including Amazon Prime and Hulu, and was nominated for "Documentary of the Year" by the London Critics' Circle Awards.

You are invited to view an exhibit containing front and rear views of the DVD, screenshots from the film featuring our church, and related documents in the display case in the Parish Hall. The exhibit is titled, "New Video Documentary Showcases 1988 Visit by Kurt Vonnegut, Jr., to Our Church." Enjoy!

expression, sexual orientation, sexual health, and cultural influences on sexuality. Our Whole Lives helps participants make informed and responsible decisions about their relationships, sexual health and behavior.

It is my hope that we will be able to provide an abbreviated series of workshops for the K-3rd grade and 4th-6th grade groups in June or July this summer, with 5 or 6 trained volunteers. There is an online training in May with seven sessions, and all sessions are mandatory to be considered fully trained. Registration for the training is due by March 27. All costs for the training will be covered by the RE budget. SHAW GOOD TO BE BACK'. – A PREVIEW (AND REVIEW) OF THE 2023 SHAW FESTIVAL

"Curtain up! Light the lights!" Now that the pandemic is receding, it's a great time to return to the Shaw Festival, and this course is your handy guide to its upcoming season. Anchored by the classic show-biz musical **Gypsy**, the playbill features two premieres of legends: the Hindu epic **Mahabharata** and the C.S. Lewis Narnian tale **Prince Caspian**. Bernard Shaw is represented by the witty comedies **The Apple Cart** and **Village Wooing**, plus his Irish compatriot J.M. Synge by **The Playboy of the Western World**. Novelists James Baldwin (**The Amen Corner**) and Edith Wharton (**Shadow of a Doubt**) provide gripping drama, while Tom Stoppard (**On the Razzle**) and Noël Coward (**Blithe Spirit**) leave 'em laughting. In short, let Shaw entertain you, and you'll have a real good time, yessir!

The month of May kicks off with UUCB's first-ever MUUsic Weekend! The Music Ministry hopes to see many of you at our production of Henry Purcell's opera Dido and Aeneas on Friday May 5th at 7:30pm. For those curious for more context about the story, the show, and our interpretation, come for the 7pm pre-show talk. Come to the show itself for the beautiful music and heart-wrenching story, performed splendidly by our choir, soloists, and guests. Afterward, stay for a reception of food, socializing, and celebration!

Then, on Sunday May 7th at our usual 10:30am service time, enjoy un-staged excerpts of the show accompanied by reflections on the power of myth and music.

The second Sunday in May will mark the one-year anniversary of the horrible mass-shooting at the Tops grocery store in Buffalo. Joan will be reflecting on this tragedy with an eye towards how we can be people of vision and move towards a better tomorrow. On this reflective service, cellist Jonathan Kaledin will share a prelude and postlude from the Bach Cello Suites. The choir will also share two favorites from their repertoire - "Road Not Taken" with music by Randall Thompson that sets the famous poem by Robert Frost, and Bob Chilcott's arrangement of U2's "MLK."

On Saturday May 20th at 2pm, cool off from Porch Fest with a more classical musical offering inside our sanctuary walls. UUCB pianist Chris Sierzchula will share with us selections from his diverse solo piano repertoire.

Sunday May 21st is RE Sunday. The service will open with Michael Harris's rendition of "Pure Imagination" from Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory. At the Offertory, Jessie Downs and Helen Lowry will share their version of Rod Stewart's "Forever Young." As the Postlude, Taryn Goehrig will sing "A Million Dreams" from The Greatest Showman.

On Sunday May 28th we will observe Memorial Day and reflect on the lives of those whom we have loved and lost. Chris will share reflective solo piano numbers as the Prelude and Postlude. At the Offertory, Helen will sing "Remember Me" from Coco, and the UUCB Choir will sing Moses Hogan's arrangement of "We Shall Walk Through the Valley in Peace" as the Reflection.

May Share-the-Plate: Providence Farm Collective



Providence Farm Collective, founded in 2019, supports refugee, immigrant and Black communities by providing farmland, farming and business education, technical assistance, and markets. The farm helps immigrants from 21 different communities including Somali Bantu, Liberian, Congolese, and Burmese to pass

on their cultural traditions and foods. It serves as a summer youth employment program and supports incubator farmers who are working to start their own agricultural small businesses. Following a successful capital fund drive in collaboration with Western New York Land Conservancy, PFC has purchased its farmland in Orchard Park, securing this fertile land for immigrant farmers and saving it from encroaching development.

Witness to Injustice: Unraveling Historic Native and U.S. Relations

Our Justice Ministry team is excited to invite Buffalo Nekanehsakt to facilitate this exercise on Saturday June 10, 2023 from 12pm to 3pm in our Parish Hall.

This interactive group exercise is a teaching tool that uses participatory education to raise awareness of the history of the relationship between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples in the part of the world now known as the United States. Through the use of meaningful quotes, and blankets that represent part of Turtle Island (the Western Hemisphere), we explore this shared history that most people rarely learn in traditional settings. We engage in a conversation about the European colonization of Turtle Island in order to deepen our understanding of the denial of Indigenous peoples' nationhood throughout U.S. History. 
