Serving you as minister has truly been an honor and a privilege. I am delighted to be part of your story.

But the time has come for us to begin our goodbyes as I let go of active ministry and you look toward the beginning of a new chapter as a vibrant faith community.

As I say goodbye, I am obliged to inform you of my professional ethical guidelines about our interactions when I am no longer your minister. The future well-being of a congregation is best assured by a fully effective departure of a minister whose service to that institution has ended. In other words, when I leave you, I need to really leave.

Beginning August 1, 2023, you and I will have no intentional contact with any of you... at least for a reasonable amount of time. You need to begin a new relationship with a new minister, and I need to live into retirement. That means we won't be scheduling any "playdates" together. No dinners, coffees, outings etc. and no exceptions. I will not cross the street to avoid you, in fact I'll wave madly and give you a big hug and ask after the family. But we can't make any plans together and we cannot talk about church. Not for a couple of years.

I don't like it either, but its for the best. These guidelines are put in place to protect both ministers and congregations during that tender time of transition when careless decisions can easily create big problems.

We have done a great job of shared ministry and bringing our mission and vision to life. Speaking for myself, you have transformed me. I am a better minister and a better person because of you. You have shown me how to faithfully do the work that needs to be done to make the world a better place. You have shown me how to give and receive compassion and forgiveness. You have taught me about humility, vulnerability, pride, and strength. For this, and so much more, I love you and always will.

With a holistic approach, OWL provides accurate, developmentally appropriate information about a range of topics, including relationships, gender identity and expression, sexual orientation, sexual health, and cultural influences on sexuality. Our Whole Lives helps participants make informed and responsible decisions about their relationships, sexual health and behavior.

It is my hope that we will be able to provide an abbreviated series of workshops for the K-3rd grade and 4th-6th grade groups in June or July this summer, with 5 or 6 trained volunteers. SHAW GOOD TO BE BACK'. – A PREVIEW (AND REVIEW) OF THE 2023 SHAW FESTIVAL

"Curtain up! Light the lights!" Now that the pandemic is receding, it's a great time to return to the Shaw Festival, and this course is your handy guide to its upcoming season. Anchored by the classic show-biz musical **Gypsy**, the playbill features two premieres of legends: the Hindu epic **Mahabharata** and the C.S. Lewis Narnian tale **Prince Caspian**. Bernard Shaw is represented by the witty comedies The **Apple Cart** and **Village Wooing**, plus his Irish compatriot J.M. Synge by **The Playboy of the Western World**. Novelists James Baldwin (The **Amen Corner**) and Edith Wharton (**Shadow of a Doubt**) provide gripping drama, while Tom Stoppard (**On the Razzle**) and Noël Coward (**Blithe Spirit**) leave 'em laughting. In short, let Shaw entertain you, and you'll have a real good time, yessir!

Music Notes Dr. Jessie Downs, Music Director





Although the church year proper is winding down for the summer, we still have some exciting musical offerings in store for the month of June!

June 4th is Pride Sunday, and just as last year, our staff soloists and Chris will be joined by guitarist Paul Zanolli, drummer Steve Rao, and vocalist Shaun Doyle for some rockin' numbers that will help get the Pride party started! As the Prelude, Jessie and the band

will offer a special tribute to recently departed "Queen of Rock 'n' Roll" Tina Turner with the fortuitously named "*Proud* Mary" (it will certainly be both "*loud and proud*"). As the Centering, Taryn and Michael will share the heartfelt "No one is Alone" from Stephen Sondheim's musical *Into the Woods*. As the Offertory, Shaun, Taryn, and Helen will perform "The Origin of Love" from Stephen Trask's rock musical *Hedwig and the Angry Inch* – an anthemic tune that playfully recounts a myth from Plato's symposium about why we search for our "other half." As the Reflection, Board President and guest vocalist Bobby Withrow will share his rendition of "Boys in the Street" - a recent pop tune that recounts a man's experience of coming out to, being rejected by, and then ultimately becoming accepted by his father. Finally, the vocal soloists, Shaun, and the band will share the triumphant gospel inspired "Coming Out of the Dark."

The title of the June 11th service is "Delight," and the UUCB Choir – joined by special guest vocalist Alex McArthur – will share several pieces that explore this theme. As the Prelude, the choir will sing "In These Delightful, Pleasant Groves" by the composer of *Dido and Aeneas*, Henry Purcell. At the Offertory, they will present another short choral gem, "Oh Taste and See" by Ralph Vaughn Williams. As the Reflection, the choir and Chris will bring to life the rich, delightful harmonies of Randall Thompson's setting of Robert Frost's "Choose Something Like a Star." Finally, Alex will share her rendition of "It's De-Lovely" from Cole Porter's musical *Red, Hot and Blue*.

On Saturday June 17th, join The Bitter Nasties for their 2pm Casual Concert, featuring performances by our very own Helen Lowry and Paul Zanolli. The Bitter Nasties are an eclectic folk rock amalgamation. The groups write original, thought-provoking and quirky music and offer fresh takes on pop classics.

For this Flower Communion (June 18th) on which we are celebrating Joan's ministry at UUCB, the music team will be sharing a variety of special offerings. Chris will begin the service with the stunning "Lilacs" by Sergei Rachmaninoff. At the Offertory, The Bitter Nasties will perform a special request from Joan, "(Nothing but) Flowers" by The Talking Heads. The Choir will pay their tribute to Joan with the Reflection "A Rose Touched By the Sun's Warm Rays" by Jean Berger. Finally, the soloists and the band will sing "The Sound" by Dr. Dog. This song about delight, change, and the power of sound will feature lead vocals by Lia Allen, who will be leaving the UUCB Music Staff after this performance.

For the last Sunday of the month, Chris and Jessie will be on call to support Rabbi Jonathan Freirich's service on social justice.



Welcome to our new Interim Minister Rev. Dr. Cathy Harrington!



Rev. Dr. Cathy Harrington is an Accredited Interim Minister who has successfully served UU congregations through their time of transition in Michigan, Florida, Tennessee and North Carolina. She also served as a settled minister for nine years.

She is no stranger to cold and snowy winters: Her home base is Ludington, Mich., and she owned a bakery/cafe in Seward, Alaska.

Cathy will be moving to Buffalo from Asheville, N.C., with her 6-year-old dog, Zoey, while her husband, Jim, patiently holds down the fort in their Ludington home. He is fully supportive of her call to ministry.

Prior to becoming a minister, Cathy was an award-winning hairdresser for 25 years and owned Miller's Daughter Bak-

ery/Cafe in Seward, Alaska, which is where she recognized that her call to feed people was a call to ministry. She drove the Al-Can Highway to Berkeley, Calif., where she spent five years (including a one-year internship in Austin, Texas) to study at Starr King School for the Ministry.

While in seminary and beyond, Cathy's ministry has been deeply informed and creatively shaped by her involvement with the Faithful Fools Street Ministry in the Tenderloin District of San Francisco.

She believes that transitional ministry should be joyful and fun as well as a time of deep discernment and exploration.

Since ordination, Cathy has dreamed of serving a church that "looks like a church" and is thrilled to be coming to UUCB.

June Share-the-Plate: GLYS WNY



The June Share the Plate recipient is GLYS WNY. GLYS WNY builds affirming cultures and supportive communities for youth of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions. GLYS provides a safe and positive environment for LGBTQ+ youth to learn more about themselves through peer interaction and educational experiences. The organization creates opportunities for emotional growth and community awareness. Through GLYS outreach, other agencies learn about and increase their sensitivity to the needs of gender

and sexual minority youth. GLYS provides LGBTQ+ youth with positive role models and a safe space, while promoting positive self-esteem and the integration of these youth into the larger community. GLYS can also assist youth and their families by providing resources and referrals.

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Respectful (Right) Relations Team and our Church Covenant

At the beginning of the year Reverend Joan and Board leadership heard about a training that is put on by the UUA and is called "Tending Covenant: Training for Right Relationship Teams". Five members of the congregation (Sharon Walker, Ginny Vaughan, Chris Slocum, Liz Parke, Steve Wixson) are currently taking this training and would like to give you a sense of our experience. While this work is called "Right "Relationship training, we would like to consider our team as a Respectful Relationship team and we will use that term going forward.

The purpose of Respectful Relationship teams is to provide congregational members with a place to deal with conflicts that might arise between individuals. We are learning that in order to function as a caring and respectful congregation we need to know how to hold each other in covenant. We need to be a congregation that understands and tries to live by its values.

We have learned some specific techniques around the restorative practices/listening circle concept. Our role is not to solve problems but to allow each individual to be heard in fact and emotions. We are neither responsible to the Board or to the Minister.

What we have learned the most, or become much more aware of, is that UUCB does not have a real Congregational Covenant. We recite our vision statement at the beginning of Service, that does not give us specifics on how we want to be in this religious community. We are a sacred organization made up of imperfect human beings. It is our hope that working with our interim minister, the board, and the larger congregational community we can create a document that not only identifies our values but gives us specifics about how we can treat each other in community. As a Respectful Relations team we will help to hold this community in covenant. Our team will be offering the Worship Service on August 27. If you have questions about our work, please contact any of us.

Witness to Injustice: Unraveling Historic Native and U.S. Relations

We are excited to host Buffalo Nekanehsakt to facilitate a KAIROS Blanket Exercise on Saturday June 10, 2023 from 12pm to 3pm in UUCB's Parish Hall at 695 Elmwood Avenue. Everyone is welcome!

Reconciliation through education and understanding: this is a participatory history lesson that fosters truth, understanding and respect among indigenous and non-indigenous peoples. Participants walk on blankets representing the land and explore the role of First Nations peoples by reading scrolls and carrying cards which ultimately determine their outcome as they literally 'walk' through situations that include precontact, treaty-making, colonization and resistance. We engage in a conversation about the European colonization of Turtle Island (the Western Hemisphere) in order to deepen our understanding of the denial of Indigenous peoples' nationhood throughout U.S. History. There is a sliding scale of \$10-\$30 to support our indigenous facilitators. 
