Minister's Column: What does it mean to be People of Exciting Transitions?

This is my final column in the UUCB Newsletter. Feeling very bitter-sweet. Actually "bitter-sweet" isn't really right. There's nothing "bitter" about it, and "sweet" isn't nearly powerful enough.

If I were to go through the emotion wheel* and pull out everything I feel about my upcoming retirement in general, and my departure from our church in particular, I might list:

sad, tender, nostalgic, frightened, anxious, regretful, moved, excited, hopeful, proud, happy, and enormously grateful.

"Honored" and "privileged" don't seem to be on the official wheel, but those too are swimming around in my sloppy emotion-pool. It was an honor and a privilege to serve you. And it always will be.

Transitions are exciting (sometimes a little too exciting), probably because of all the emotions fighting for attention in our hearts and minds, and in our communities. Sometimes that can lead to...shall we say, difficulties.

I know that when young people are about to leave home for the first time, there can be a period of individuation. The young person and those being left behind can start arguing about every little thing, just to make the departure "easier." Individuation can happen anytime someone leaves anything. Tends to leave everyone in shreds and tatters. Not a great way to go.

Sometimes in a community, when a transition is afoot, one person may feel one thing and another person may feel something else. Sometimes the variety of emotional experience is not acknowledged, or honored, and misunderstandings take root and grow into conflicts. Yuck.

Some people don't like goodbyes. I am one of these. I get all soggy and snotty and my eyes puff up and my voice gets squeaky. I feel like I am losing my dignity – on the emotion wheel it is called feeling ashamed. That's a lousy feeling so I often try to fade away rather than say goodbye properly. Fading away is basically an unhealthy coping strategy and does not honor the people I love and who care for me.

Alternatively, sometimes I just "perform" my way through the transitions, and nobody gets to see the tears of the clown. Not very authentic.

I am very sad about leaving our beloved community, but don't get me wrong. Sadness is not all that I am. There's all that other stuff going on too. After all, we had a phenomenally joyful dance party at the end of the service on Sunday, June 18. That happiness will stay with me forever.

Walt Whitman said it best,

Do I contradict myself? Very well then I contradict myself, (I am large, I contain multitudes.)

I am large, I contain multitudes, and so do you, and so does your community. Acknowledge that diversity and variety of emotions going on during this time of exciting transitions. Listen to each other. Be curious and compassionate. You are not riding a wave of emotion – crashing and rising – you are the water. You are the beloved community in all your glory and always will be.

Thank you for letting me be part of your life.

Greetings from the Religious Education Ministry!

Hello UUCB!

Join me for four weeks of fun, interactive religious education this July with Camp Element! Camp Element will take place during usual RE time, 10:30-11:30 on Sundays – 7/9, 7/16, 7/23, and 7/30. July 9 we'll be exploring Earth and decorating our own flowerpots. July 16, we'll make wooden bead wind chimes and play with bubbles to talk about Wind. On July

23, we'll talk about Fire Communion practices and how the Sun is related to Fire as we paint our own suncatchers. And wear your bathing suits for July 30 to end off the four weeks playing with Water! Parents are welcome to participate.

Have you ever wanted to teach a religious education class, volunteer in the nursery, or join an adult faith development ministry team? Now is your chance! We will need at least twenty volunteer teachers, youth advisors, and a few additional nursery volunteers in the upcoming year, as our religious education program and attendance continue to grow!

We especially need a few more trained volunteers to be able to bring back the Our Whole Lives comprehensive sexuality education program for three age groups: grades 1-3, 4-6, and 7-9. The training is a total of 20 hours, and costs for the training are covered by UUCB. Registration for an online training for the high school levels opens on July 17, and for the elementary school levels opens on August 21. Parents can't teach their own children in OWL, but let's create the village that teaches each other's kids!

I am also working on forming two ministry teams for next year: Adult Faith Development, and Religious Education for children, youth, and parents. Would you like to see more faith development programming for adults? Talk to me about joining the Adult Faith Development Ministry Team! Would you like to help with special programming for kids and parents, including potlucks and party planning? Talk to me about the Religious Education Ministry Team!

With a holistic approach, OWL provides accurate, developmentally appropriate information about a range of topics, including relationships, gender identity and expression, sexual orientation, sexual health, and cultural influences on sexuality. Our Whole Lives helps participants make informed and responsible decisions about their relationships, sexual health and behavior.

It is my hope that we will be able to provide an abbreviated series of workshops for the K-3rd grade and 4th-6th grade groups in June or July this summer, with 5 or 6 trained volunteers. There is an online training in May with seven sessions, and all sessions are mandatory to be considered fully trained. Registration for the training is due by March 27. All costs for the training will be covered by the RE budget. SHAW GOOD TO BE BACK! — A PREVIEW (AND REVIEW) OF THE 2023 SHAW FESTIVAL

"Curtain up! Light the lights!" Now that the pandemic is receding, it's a great time to return to the Shaw Festival, and this course is your handy guide to its upcoming season. Anchored by the classic show-biz musical Gypsy, the playbill features two premieres of legends: the Hindu epic *Mahabharata* and the C.S. Lewis Narnian tale Prince Caspian. Bernard Shaw is represented by the witty comedies The Apple Cart and Village Wooing, plus his Irish compatriot J.M. Synge by The Playboy of the Western World. Novelists James Baldwin (The Amen Corner) and Edith Wharton (Shadow of a Doubt) provide gripping drama, while Tom Stoppard (On the Razzle) and Noël Coward (Blithe Spirit) leave 'em laughting. In short, let Shaw entertain you, and you'll have a real good time, yessir!

Service Music this July will be provided by a combination of Music Staff, guests, and volunteers. There will also be another exciting installment in our ongoing Casual Concert series.

On Sunday July 2nd, Eve Holberg will be leading a service combining spoken and sung poetry. As the Prelude, UUCB Choir volunteer Jim Jarvis will sing and play "One Too Many Mornings" by that great musical poet Bob Dylan. At the Offertory, UUCB Choir volunteer Leslie Boldt will sing the

French art song "Extase" by Henri DuParc, accompanied by UUCB Pianist Chris Sierzchula. As the Reflection, Jim and Leslie will combine forces for "Suzanne" by another poetic soul, Leonard Cohen. As the Postlude, Music Director Jessie Downs and Chris will share Billy Joel's introspective "Summer, Highland Falls."

On Sunday July 9th, Bass Soloist Michael Harris and guest pianist Nick Emmanuel will offer up musical selections that speak to UUCB's musical heritage. As the Prelude, Nick will play J.S. Bach's Partita No. 1 as an allusion to UUCB's long tradition of Bach-centric Music Sundays. As the Offertory, Michael will sing a song of his own creation - "Wisdom in the Windows," which speaks to just how special our sacred space has been and continues to be. As the Postlude, Nick will share an excerpt from Jessie's "Variations" for solo piano.

This month's <u>Casual Concert</u> will feature performance artist Little Cake on Saturday July 15th at 2pm in the sanctuary. Little Cake is the stage name of Ana Vafai, who creates songs, teaches music, and builds community in Buffalo NY. Little Cake is praised for her unique, engaging stage presence, and her musical arrangements. Her compositions have been known to overwhelm audiences with joy, emotion and whimsy, earning her the award for "Best Local Music Act" by the Buffalo Spree in 2017. Join us for Ana's special solo performance at UUCB! It's sure to be a hoot!

On Sunday July 16th, Michael Harris will again be the featured vocalist, this time with Chris Sierzchula on the keys. Together, they will share excerpts by the jazz pop band Pink Martini. These whimsical numbers will help illustrate Julie Taylor's sermon about the magic of taking walks. As the Prelude, Michael and Chris will perform "Sympathique," a jaunty number sung in French. The cutesy yet inspirational "Hang on Little Tomato" will serve as the Offertory and include a special musical surprise. The Schumann-inspired "Butterfly Song" will be the Reflection, which will then be echoed by an excerpt from the song's source materials - "Papillons" by Robert Schumann – as the Postlude.

On Sunday July 23rd, Jessie and Chris will share some synth-y selections based on Charlene Mongomery's theme of "Breaking Free." Of course, Jessie will take this opportunity to sing "I Want to Break Free" by John Deacon, bassist of Queen. She will also share another rock favorite "Break on Through" by The Doors, and Chris will play a piece or two from his own repertory.

Finally, on Sunday July 30th, guest speaker Shaun Doyle will also serve as our guest singer, sharing special music along-side returning guest pianist Nick Emmanuel. Together they will share bittersweet songs by Barry Manilow and reflections on their emotional impact on our lives.

to ministry.



While in seminary and beyond, Cathy's ministry has been deeply informed and creatively shaped by her involvement with the Faithful Fools Street Ministry in the Tenderloin District of San Francisco.

She believes that transitional ministry should be joyful and fun as well as a time of deep discernment and exploration.

Since ordination, Cathy has dreamed of serving a church that "looks like a church" and is thrilled to be coming to UUCB.



July Share-the-Plate: The Buffalo Peace House



The Buffalo Peace House provides safe, clean housing, food and other necessary services to asylum seekers in Western New York. For over ten years the Peace House has been working closely with other service aligned agencies in the area to serve the many vulnerable individuals who arrive here regularly.

Located in Hamburg, we strive to provide a home-like, welcoming atmosphere where asylees can feel settled and safe during what is often a years-long process of navigating the complex legal

process. While waiting for their legal status to be resolved, asylees cannot work and are not eligible for government benefits. The Peace House strives to ensure that residents most basic needs are met and coordinates with other agencies to arrange access to legal and medical care.

Respectful (Right) Relations Team and our Church Covenant

At the beginning of the year Reverend Joan and Board leadership heard about a training that is put on by the UUA and is called "Tending Covenant: Training for Right Relationship Teams". Five members of the congregation (Sharon Walker, Ginny Vaughan, Chris Slocum, Liz Parke, Steve Wixson) are currently taking this training and would like to give you a sense of our experience. While this work is called "Right "Relationship training, we would like to consider our team as a Respectful Relationship team and we will use that term going forward.

The purpose of Respectful Relationship teams is to provide congregational members with a place to deal with conflicts that might arise between individuals. We are learning that in order to function as a caring and respectful congregation we need to know how to hold each other in covenant. We need to be a congregation that understands and tries to live by its values.

We have learned some specific techniques around the restorative practices/ listening circle concept. Our role is not to solve problems but to allow each individual to be heard in fact and emotions. We are neither responsible to the Board or to the Minister.

What we have learned the most, or become much more aware of, is that UUCB does not have a real Congregational Covenant. We recite our vision statement at the beginning of Service, that does not give us specifics on how we want to be in this religious community. We are a sacred organization made up of imperfect human beings. It is our hope that working with our interim minister, the board, and the larger congregational community we can create a document that not only identifies our values but gives us specifics about how we can treat each other in community. As a Respectful Relations team we will help to hold this community in covenant. Our team will be offering the Worship Service on August 27. If you have questions about our work, please contact any of us.
