# What does it mean to be a people of generosity?

November's Soul Matters theme invites us to understand generosity as a form of kindness that moves us beyond charity to a deeper commitment to end the inequity and poverty.

As Laura Arrillaga-Andreessen put it, "Charity is about helping people survive. Justice is about helping people thrive."

Generosity isn't always about money, it is also about presence and showing up when someone is in need. To "love wastefully" by generously spending our time caring for another can be lifechanging. When I think of the transformative nature of generosity, I am reminded of Henri Nouwen, the Dutch priest who had been a professor at Notre Dame, Harvard, and Yale, as well as a prolific writer, but it wasn't until he went to serve at L'Arche Daybreak as their pastor from 1986 until his death in 1996 that he found his true path. His 38<sup>th</sup> book, *Adam: God's Beloved* tells the story of Nouwen's transformative experience of caring for a severely handicapped young man named, Adam, who could not speak or even move without assistance. Gripped by frequent seizures, he spent his life in obscurity, and yet Adam became Nouwen's friend, teacher, and guide." When Nouwen agreed to be Adam's caregiver, he was afraid of Adam at first, but over time Adam taught him that "the very center of what it means to be human is the ability to give and receive love." Our first two Worship services this month will explore the meaning of generosity from the aspect of both giving and receiving. Brene Brown wrote, "We often associate kindness with giving. I think that's true, but I've also come to believe that there is a deeply spiritual type of kindness that happens when we give ourselves permission to receive." On November 5<sup>th</sup>, we will explore that notion that giving and receiving are the same. On November 12<sup>th</sup>, I'll share what I learned about generosity and love while on my first street retreat in the Tenderloin of San Francisco with the Faithful Fools Street Ministry.

Sharon Salzburg writes, "The Buddha said that a true spiritual life is not possible without a generous heart. If we practice joyful giving, we experience confidence. We grow in self-esteem, self-respect, and well-being because we continually test our limits." Generosity in Buddhism is practicing letting go of our attachments, the beginning of spiritual awakening.

The world's great wisdom traditions exalt generosity as a spiritual practice. This month, we are invited to see generosity as more than giving to those in need during the holidays but as a path of transformation for both the giver and the receiver.

#### November 5: The Gift by Rev. Cathy Harrington

All the world's great wisdom traditions praise the act of giving. Christianity states that it is more blessed to give than receive, but I challenge the notion that it is more blessed to give. This is so ingrained in our society that we often



find it more difficult to receive than to give. This is a sermon about learning that to receive a gift graciously is actually a form of giving.

#### November 12: Bearing Witness, by Rev. Cathy Harrington

A seminarian's experience of spending several days living on the streets of San Francisco's Tenderloin District with the Faithful Fools Street Ministry. The Fools believe that crossing social barriers is the only way to become one with the other because you must challenge your norms, change your paradigms until you strip away the image of who you think you are. As Buddhist Bernie Glassman teaches, "When we really listen, when we really pay attention to the sounds of joy and suffering in the universe, then we are not separate from them, we become them.

#### November 19th: "Prayers for God's Peace"

We will hear excerpts from the prior evenings events performed at UUCB and Slee Hall, but in the context of a moving service at our church that will include information about the history and lived experience of the war in Ukraine, as well as how we in the U.S. can help. 
There is so much excitement coming up this month!

#### **Music Notes**

#### Dr. Jessie Downs, Music Director



This November brings with it not only our usual variety of service music, but also our Fall Music Weekend, and a special Casual Concert treat.

The month kicks off on Sunday November 5<sup>th</sup> with a service about giving and receiving. As the Prelude, Chris will share another installment in his exploration of piano pieces by mystic G.I. Gurdjieff and Ukrainian composer Thomas De Hartmann. As the Offertory, the UUCB Choir will share "Y'Varech'cha" by Max Janowski, a piece sung partly in Hebrew (by Michael Harris) and partly in English (by the choir) – alluding to Cathy's

engagement with the Jewish tradition of "midrash" in her sermon. As the Reflection, the UUCB soloists will share "I'll Cover You – Reprise" from the musical Rent, a song about selflessly giving and receiving love. Finally, as the Postlude, the soloists will share "All Good Gifts" from Godspell, a song celebrating the many blessings that life has to offer.

On November 12<sup>th</sup>, Cathy will share stories about some of her formative experiences working with the Faithful Fools, and the musical selections will speak to how we all might seek to engage with those on the margins of our society. As the Prelude, Jessie and Helen will share their rendition of Queen and David Bowie's "Under Pressure" with a backing track by Alex Huddleston, the lyrics of which proclaim that "Love dares you to care for the people on the edge of the light." At the Offertory, Jessie and Helen will be joined by the HoUUse Band for The Who's "Behind Blue Eyes," a sardonic yet heartfelt song about the contradictory ways we see marginalized persons. As the Reflection, Helen and Paul will share a unique rendition of "Hello in There" by John Prine, interspersed with readings of The Beatitudes. Finally, Chris will close out the service with a reflective piano Postlude.

The weekend of November 17<sup>th</sup>, 18<sup>th</sup>, and 19<sup>th</sup> is both our Fall MUUsic Weekend and the weekend of our November Casual Concert. This Fall's MUUsic Weekend is entitled "Prayers for Peace – collaborative choral concerts in solidarity with the people of Ukraine." For these events, the choir will be presenting Ukrainian choral works in collaboration with the UB Choir and Chorus, Mriya Ukrainian Women's Choir, and St. Nicholas Ukrainian Catholic Church Choir – creating a combined choir of over 100 people. The concerts will also feature three Ukrainian vocal soloists and a local Polish soprano, as well as the sounds of the bandura (the Ukrainian national instrument), guitar, and piano. On opening night 11/17 at 7:30pm in our sanctuary, we will welcome the larger community into our space for this fabulous concert followed by a catered reception of traditional Ukrainian food. Reserve your spot for this special event and consider donating NOW on Eventbrite or after church in the Parish Hall on Sunday 11/5 or 11/12. Donations will be shared between the church and the Ukrainian American Freedom Foundation, which provides humanitarian aid to people in Ukraine.

On Saturday 11/18 at 2pm, our November Casual Concert will feature acclaimed jazz vocalist Alex McArthur presenting a special sneak-peak of her Phil Collin's musical in-progress. That evening, you can catch the Ukrainian concert again at UB's Slee Hall, with additional numbers by the UB Chorus. Finally, on Sunday 11/19, the service will center around the history of the conflict in Ukraine and how we can help, with a reprise of some of the concerts' more reflective numbers.

On the final Sunday of the month, we welcome guest speaker Rabbi Jonathan Friedrich as well as guest pianist Nicholas Emmanuel. For the Prelude and Postlude, Nick will share two reflective contemporary piano pieces by John Cage and Arvo Pärt respectively. At the Offertory, Michael Harris will share the Hebrew song "Ba'a M'enucha" as arranged by Kurt Weil, and as the Reflection, the Chamber Choir will sing "The Last Words of David" as set by Randall Thompson as we reflect upon the latest escalations in the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.
