A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD

Hello members of UUCB! Members of the Board of Trustees will be submitting highlights of the prior board meeting to the newsletter, with the goal of keeping you informed without your needing to peruse the entire meeting minutes.

The Board of Trustees met on March 20th. We welcomed the Right Relations Team and learned about their proposed process to help the congregation arrive at a church Covenant; the Team will work with the Minister to undertake communication and engagement with the congregation beginning in April, with a plan to adopt a Covenant in June. Look for information on Covenants in the e-Blast through April 14. The Board supports the Covenant initiative. Four additional team members are being sought, to bring the Right Relations Team to a full roster of seven. We are grateful to the Right Relations team for their efforts and encourage upcoming participation by all areas of the church.

The Board spent most of its meeting discussing the finances of the church, including the pledge drive, an update on the capital campaign, the Finance Committee's report, and the Treasurer's report. We discussed the gap in the budget that exists right now, and strategies to close it. The most palatable solutions are to ensure pledging of our members and support of church events and fundraising opportunities. Pledging helps the church know to what extent your financial support will be contributing to the operations of the community. If you or someone you know would like to get on track to becoming a new member, look for news about new member classes being held; the next classes are scheduled to start April 7 and more details can be had by contacting the Director of Religious Education (DRE) Jess Pond at <u>joond@buffalouu.org</u>. Church events and fundraising opportunities are detailed in the monthly newsletter. The church website at buffalouu.org is another terrific resource, providing access to the weekly e-blast, an Events page, and church Calendar.

Most if not all of us have been enjoying luncheons provided by the new food ministry during fellowship in the Parish Hall after Sunday Services. New tastes for our taste buds, incredibly creative food presentations, and the happy sound of people sharing meals have been hallmarks of these luncheons, and are most welcome. The Board discussed the goals and growing popularity of the luncheons and the food ministry, and how volunteers, staff, kitchen facilities and operation of the kitchen can continue to work together to meet the opportunities provided by luncheon preparation, the luncheons themselves, and clean-up, and how to handle donations made to support the luncheons. Chris Slocum is developing documentation to facilitate handling the donations which will result in improvement in all aspects of the luncheons and ministry.

The agenda also included reports and updates on the much-appreciated activities of the Minister, DRE, the Governance Team, congregational safety, settled minister search, conflict of interest policies, and more. We are a busy, vibrant community. To get in touch with your Board of Trustees:

Minister's Musings

The Gift of Interdependence

Our Soul Matters theme this month focuses heavily on our interdependence with the earth and our climate crisis, which is good. We need to focus more closely on our relationship with the planet and all living things every single day, doing what we can to preserve and care for our interdependent web of all existence.

But for our time together this April and because we are going to wind up the covenanting process started last fall this month, I was drawn to this quote from Victoria Safford:

Douglas Steere, a Quaker teacher, says that the ancient question, "Who am I?" inevitably leads to a deeper one, "Whose am I?" – because there is no identity outside of relationship. You can't be a person by yourself. To ask, "Whose am I?" is to extend the question far beyond the little self-absorbed self, and wonder, Who needs you? Who loves you? To whom are you accountable? To whom do you answer? Whose life is altered by your choices? With whose life, whose lives, is your own all bound up, inextricably, in obvious or invisible ways?

"So, whose are we?" asks Sara Lammert, "Whose are we in a world that seems upside down, filled with violence and depravation and oppression? Whose are we in world that is at the same time brimming with beauty, potential, freedom, and love?"

On April 14th, I will be joined in the pulpit by Liz Parke and Sharon Walker as we continue our work on creating a covenant for the church. Because we do not have a creed, our church is bound together by its covenant. We are a covenantal faith, and we make sacred promises to each other.

What is a covenant? It has been explained this way: A covenant, a relationship, formed by love is measured by the way we consent to be transformed by affection, into greater affection.

Our Unitarian Universalist congregational polity is affirmed by our covenant with one another; to support, to honor, to grow into a greater affection for ourselves and the world. Our vision of becoming better people, better parents, and better citizens of the world, are only made possible by our willingness to walk together on the journey. Having a covenant does not mean we have to agree with one another all the time. A covenant promises that when we disagree, we will stay the course. We will listen, and we will honor and acknowledge one another as we work towards understanding and resolution. "We need not think alike to love alike." ~ Francis David (1510-1579)

In preparation for this important work, we will do together, please watch this beautiful, animated short video created by Unitarian Universalist and graphic designer in Columbus, Ohio, Elliott Cennamo. In Unitarian Universalism, as we strive to be inclusive and transformative in our covenanting, and as we grow our personal understanding, strengthen and deepen our beloved community, and practice spiritual justice-making in our covenantal faith, we must ask, "What do we promise one another?"


April 24 English Faeries: An exploration of how stories of magical forest-dwellers challenged rigid social rules, and promoted the preservation of British woodlands.

The month of April kicks off with our Spring 2024 Sunday, a special Sunday morning service centered around a beloved classical masterwork.

On Sunday morning April 7th, Eastman DMA organist Augustine Sobeng will accompany our choir on Gabriel Fauré's Requiem, a meditative half-hour of music that explores the impact of grief. For this special service, our choir will also be joined by 5 guest vocal artists from the Sotto Voce collective – altos Jamie Gangemi and Erin Alexander, tenors Tyler Huk and Zane Merritt, and baritone Ky Ver Hoef. In addition to our group's lush ensemble sound, audiences will also be treated to solos by our Soprano Soloist Taryn Goehrig, and guest baritone Ky Ver Hoef.

On Sunday, April 14th, Cathy will be exploring what it means to make "Sacred Promises to Each Other." To activate our generosity of spirit, pianist Christopher Sierzchula will share a soulful Prelude. At the Offertory, Taryn Goehrig and Shaun Doyle will share "What Else Can I Do" from the Disney movie Encanto. As the Postlude, Jessie Downs will share American songbook classic "What the World Needs Now."

On Saturday, April 20th at 2pm, we welcome back flute and guitar Duo Purla to our sanctuary for their second Casual Concert. In addition to classical works by Beethoven, Haydn, Paganini, Piazzolla and others, their sets include newly commissioned pieces and original compositions. Admission is pay-what-you-can and is split between the artists and the music ministry.

For April 21st's service on "Rediscovering Prayer," Chris will open the service with a unique rendition of the prayer of St. Francis. For the Offertory and Reflection, the UUCB Choir will sing spirited arrangements of two traditional songs - "Down in the River to Pray" and "Kumbaya." As the Postlude, Taryn will lead the UUCB Soloists in the groovy "O Bless the Lord my Soul" from the musical Godspell.

April 28th is this year's youth-led service, featuring youth musicians with support from the music staff. Youth pianist Luca DePietro will share the first movement of Beethoven's piano Sonata in F Major as the Prelude, and flautist Kaitlyn Dissek will provide the Postlude. At the Offertory Jessie and Shaun will share their rendition of "Ain't No Mountain High Enough." This song captures the challenges the youth faced during distance learning and the joy they felt when they came back together in community.


Music Sunday

Cabaret



Legacies at UUCB

LEAVING A UUCB LEGACY

There is a lot of talk about finances around UUCB, between the annual stewardship drive, the upcoming Capital Campaign, the annual budget, and even the Endowment Fund. What is it all about? Why is it so important??

It is all tied into what keeps us going day-to-day and moving forward as a UU congregation. It allows us to pay our talented staff and personnel, maintain our beautiful, aging building, keep our in-church programs going, continue our outreach community work, and provide us a means to search for a settled minister.

The stewardship drive provides us with a basis for our annual budget for day-to-day operations. The Capital Campaign, in addition to the Sacred Spaces grant award, will allow the church to focus on completing many longer-term projects that are needed around the church, in terms of safety, accessibility, preservation, and beautification.

That leaves the Endowment Fund, which currently totals \$1,347,500. The majority of this money is invested in the UUCEF account, managed through the UUA. The remainder is invested in a money market account and CD. A portion (4%, approximately \$56,000) of the Endowment Fund makes up an essential part of the operating budget of the church each year.

The Endowment Fund was created from investments and bequests from members of UUCB who chose to leave a monetary gift for future use by the church, upon their passing. Their belief in the principles of Unitarian Universalism and specifically UUCB, to value diversity, and social justice for all, provide an outstanding music program, and provide a safe space for everyone, has ensured the well-being of UUCB for generations. However, the Endowment Fund needs to be replenished to be sustainable. Have you thought about your UUCB legacy? How will you continue to make an impact over time?

Please consider making arrangements for such a gift to our Endowment Fund. You can help to carry on the history of this unique place and what it offers for future generations. There are many options to make a legacy gift, it can come from anyone, and in any size. MEMORIAL PATHWAY

So, What Is a Covenant?

The word "Covenant" is both a noun and a verb. It can be a written agreement among individual community members promising to behave in certain ways, and it can mean to engage in mutual promises with Spirit, with other people, and communities.

A Covenant is different from a rule. If you break a rule, then there is usually a defined consequence, often a punishment, for doing that. If we break a covenant, it's not a matter of punishment. Rather, if we want to stay in that relationship, we need to work with other members of the covenant to heal what has been broken and to reaffirm our commitment to the covenant.

SHARE THE PLATE

In April, we support Little Portion Friary as a share-the-plate partner.

The Mission of Little Portion Friary is to journey with our guests experiencing homelessness in a homelike environment and provide temporary shelter, meals, and counseling during their struggle to acquire permanent housing and jobs.



The Little Portion Friary was started in 1982 when Deacon John G. and the Rev. Alexius realized that homeless men and women needed a homelike setting and a sense of personal involvement with individuals who cared about them.

They envisioned a setting in which people from all walks of life would bring their talents and gifts, working anonymously and quietly, to help those in need. They established a Franciscan community to be known as the Little Portion Friary.

To St. Francis, the name represented the poverty, humility, and simplicity that he wished for himself and his followers. For Buffalo's Little Portion, the name reflects a commitment to St. Francis' ideals and hope of allowing our lives, in little ways to touch and be touched by the lives of others.

We depend almost entirely on donations and the efforts of volunteer workers and remain in awe of the generosity that has sustained us this long.

Those who volunteer here work together as a team, without publicity, positions, or titles, so that guests can regain control over their lives. Guests have given of themselves by offering comfort and encouragement to one another in their struggles.

We especially need your prayers and encouragement. Your openness to the causes and effects of poverty and homelessness.

OUR CHURCH HISTORY


A popular way to assess our nation's leaders is to rate U.S. Presidents. A recent survey of historians and experts on the Presidency has rated Abraham Lincoln as the greatest U.S. President. The fact that Mr. Lincoln as President-Elect worshipped at our former church building, the First Unitarian Church at 110 Franklin St. in Buffalo, on February 17, 1861, en route to his inauguration is very special. It is even more notable when we consider that the building has been the focus of \$5+ million in renovations as part of the county's Covid response, and while doing the renovations, Erie County designated it as the "Lincoln Building."


To allow us to fully appreciate Mr. Lincoln's visit and this designation, a new exhibit has been put in place in the display case in the Parish Hall. The exhibit describes what happened during his visit and the history and changes to the building at 110 Franklin St., and includes a map of his train route, a sketch of the crowd greeting him upon his arrival in Buffalo, a copy of WNY Heritage magazine which features a mural depicting him giving a speech from the balcony of his hotel a day before attending our church service, and a contemporary newspaper account of his church visit.

Mr. Lincoln's First Inaugural Address in Washington, DC, on March 4, 1861, was just 16 days after he sat in the pew as a guest of former U.S. President Millard Fillmore at the First Unitarian Church at 110 Franklin St. in Buffalo. Amazing.

Prior to the most recent renovation, the building at 110 Franklin St. had experienced neglect but thanks to Erie County Executive Mark Poloncarz's and the County Legislature's leadership, its rehab, new occupancy, and renaming, the building's future is secure and awareness of its high place in Western New York history is growing. I hope you'll visit the exhibit, and enjoy learning more about our Lincoln connection.
