A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD

Hello members of UUCB! Members of the Board of Trustees will be submitting highlights of the prior board meeting to the newsletter, with the goal of keeping you informed without needing to peruse the entire meeting meetings.

The newly elected Board of Trustees met in February for three hours. We discussed some introductory things such as the Board covenant, procedures, and our roles in the church. Mary Bisson from the Oversight Committee came to talk about their role and work. They do a lot to help the board stay abreast of UUCB's committee and advisory committees and we appreciate their work! We are a bit unusual as a church to have an oversight committee. We discussed that we need a personnel committee. Are you a member and do you have experience in human resources, supervising staff, or employment law? This may be a fabulous opportunity for you to contribute to the community.

We spent a long time talking about the finances of the church, including the pledge drive and the budget. We had a successful fundraiser with the Lupercalia singles mixer and there's demand in the Buffalo community for more queer-friendly, not-alcohol driven social spaces. If you haven't submitted your 2024 pledge yet, please do so, because there is a gap in the budget right now and we need to know to what extent your financial support will be contributing to the operations of the community.

Board members will be reaching out (or maybe by the publication of this, already have) to members of the congregation to find out who you'd like to see on the ministerial search committee. We will need seven people willing to devote time and heart to this process and who are good stewards of the congregation. Think about it. And let us know.

You also don't have to wait for us to reach out to you - please feel free to contact the board (<u>board@buffalouu.org</u>) if you want to share your thoughts about people on the ministerial search committee.

We also spent some time talking about our safety policies and procedures. UUCB does have a disruptive behavior policy. The Board takes issues of safety very seriously and recognizes the importance of responding in a thoughtful and proactive manner aligned with our values. With that said, we are also starting to explore if there are other things we should do given the state of the world. Bill Parke (a member of the board) is going to be looking into policies and procedures and Chris Slocum reached out through some of her professional connections to someone at FEMA who explicitly works with houses of worship about safety policies to get more information.

We will be meeting in March. The current agenda includes a discussion of our finances, a ministerial search, a right relationship committee, and conflict of interest policies. If you have a matter for the board, please contact us at Board@Buffalouu.org.

Minister's Musings

Dear ones,

We are over the hump, right? Winter, I mean.

I remember living in Alaska, March was the month that everything changed. The daylight was accelerating rapidly, and signs of new life were exploding everywhere. People emerged from their hibernation with renewed energy and restored enthusiasm for life. The snow-capped mountains were greening up for summer as the town prepared for the anticipated rush of tourists. It was a special time we shared without the presence of tourists (it was just us) and the exhaustion of earning a living in a busy tourist community. It was a leisure time to appreciate the miracle of nature uninterrupted and the gift of living in such an awesome place.

And then there was the satisfaction of knowing we had survived another winter.

The eagles that spent most of the winter in town by the middle of March moved out into the wilderness where food supplies were once again readily available. I was told they have been known to make a meal of pets left outdoors when the food supply was scarce. I was very protective of my cat, Little, terrified she would be swooped away in the talons of an eagle. I watched many times as they landed on an unsuspecting animal or fish and soared away with their prey dangling beneath them. Little spent her winter days perched on a windowsill watching with interest as the eagles and the shiny-coated black ravens that would come to feast on the leftover bread from our bakery which we offered to their supplement their winter meal. Little's tail twitched nervously as her hind legs skillfully postured and swayed with that hunter's readiness to pounce in an instant on birds that easily outweighed her triple or more. Silly cat.

Feline windowsill fantasies, I can totally relate, can't you?

And then I was told that they once found the remains of a hiker (a tourist of course) inside the stomach of a bear and his Timex watch was still ticking! Darn it, this was when I began to suspect this Southern girl was being buffaloed.

Moose often resorted to eating the bark off trees in our yards when the snow was really deep, and the winter was long because food was scarce. Since it couldn't possibly be a good thing for the trees, I tried to shoo an intruding moose from our backyard. I stood on the porch and yelled with a tone as fierce as I could muster, "Shoo! Shoo! Ya Boo!" He stopped chewing and with a look that could only be described as annoyed slowly raised his massive head burdened by an impressive rack of broad and tangled horns and snorted at me releasing a huge and ominous sound as volumes of steam spewed from his nostrils. March 3: Celebrating Black Lives by Rev. Cathy Harrington

This week we will honor African Américans who have changed the world. We will celebrate Blacks who have enriched America through their art, literature, music, and courageous leadership.





On March 3rd, the UUCB Choir and pianist Christopher Sierzchula will share a variety of pieces that celebrate black musicians. As the Prelude, Chris will play a rag by famous ragtime composer Scott Joplin. As the Offertory, the UUCB choir will sing "I'm Gonna Sing Til the Spirit Moves in My Heart" a spiritual arranged by celebrated composer/arranger Moses Hogan. As the Reflection, Chris will play "Round Midnight" by revolutionary jazz composer Thelonious Monk. A version of "Isn't She Lovely" by the inimitable Stevie Wonder will close out the morning.

On March 10th, Julie Taylor will be leading a fun service centered around the Barbie movie. Our UUCB soloists will be supported by our HoUUse Band in sharing some of the movie's most memorable musical numbers originally performed by Lizzo, the Indigo Girls, Billie Eilish, and Ryan Gosling.

Saturday, March 16th is the date of this month's Casual Concert, featuring traveling vocalist, instrumentalist, and songwriter Matt Venuti. Note that this event will be held at 4pm rather than the usual 2pm time. Come out to hear something different and to support both a working artist and our own community!

Thursday, March 14th is another great Thursday to try out the choir, 7:30-9:45pm. We will likely only spend the first part of rehearsal on the coming week's fun offerings (see information below). All are welcome!

On March 17th, Cathy will be discussing the changes to the Seven Principles, with a focus on the importance of centering ourselves in love. As the Prelude, Chris will share the lovely Nocturne Op. 16 No. 4 by Jan Ignace Paderewski. At the Offertory, the UUCB Choir will sing a moving arrangement of Simon and Garfunkel's "Bridge Over Troubled Water," a song about helping one another through life's challenges. As the Reflection, the Choir will sing the heartfelt "Ukuthula," a traditional South African song of praise. As the Postlude, Chris will sing and play "Aspirations," a groovy piece about the importance of visioning for the future.

On March 24th, Cathy will share thoughts about the miracles that abound in everyday life but often go unnoticed. The service will begin and end with impressionist piano music from Chris and feature musical theatre vocal offerings from Helen Lowry and Taryn Goehrig about enjoying and making the most out of life.




Gathering of Grievers
